

EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER (EOC)

EOC Objectives

- Ensure the safety of responders and the community for the duration of the incident.
- Provide for the immediate & ongoing basic and hygienic needs for affected communities.
- Keep the public and key stakeholders informed on the status of the recovery efforts.
- Develop immediate-term and long-term Recovery Plan.
- Monitor debris management operations and improve access into affected areas.
- Provide support and coordination to county departments, local municipalities, and partner agencies to strengthen joint efforts and ensure a unified response for community recovery.

INITIAL RESPONSE

• Emergency/Rescue Efforts

- 5,500 calls received to 911 by 9/28
- 18 USAR & swift water teams supporting operations

Communications

- Widespread & enduring Internet and cellular outages
- Online geotagging damage reporting tool launched 10/5

Infrastructure

- 1,989 landslides identified
- Roadway damage; Interstates I-40 & I-26 closed
- More than 350 bridges damaged or destroyed
- Widespread water outages and water infrastructure disruption

Electricity

• Nearly 100,000 households without power (10/2)

Sheltering

• 585 people sheltered (peaked on 10/8)

Donations and Volunteer Management


840 volunteers deployed to Family Assistance Center (10/3)

RESPONSE & RECOVERY

POINTS OF DISTRIBUTION & COMMUNITY CARE STATIONS

- 8 locations open across the county (County-specific sites)
- Nearly 100,000 cases + 200,000+ gallons of potable water & 84,000 gallons non-potable water distributed as of 11/18
- 29,177+ showers and 25,850+ loads of laundry as of 11/18

FOOD ASSISTANCE

16,950 households approved for DSNAP for \$10+ million in benefits

PUBLIC HEALTH

- Monitoring and awareness of outbreaks & health risks
- 1,700+ vaccines administered by 11/7

DEBRIS REMOVAL

• 10M+ cubic yards of debris estimated; 174K collected as of 11/18





RESPONSE & RECOVERY

TEMPORARY HOUSING SOLUTIONS (FEMA)

- 1,664 households checked into transitional sheltering assistance as of 11/13
- 149 households approved for direct housing assistance.
- 4 direct housing unit placed on private sites

DAMAGE ASSESSMENTS (COMMUNITY & PUBLIC)

- 214 linear miles of floodplain impact; \$1.2+ in agriculture crop loss
- 1,150 initial damage assessments completed (out of 2,092; approx. 54%). These include damage points within the City of Asheville

RESTABLISHING COUNTY SERVICES

- Successful 2024 election effort
- Public-facing services and facilities opening, such as permits office, health clinic, some parks/libraries & more reopening





TRANSITION FROM EMERGENCY RESPONSE TO RECOVERY SUPPORT

RECOVERY SUPPORT ACTIVITIES

- Convene RSF Task Forces
- Complete an initial recovery planning process.
- Identify achievable, tangible communitybased recovery actions and activities
- Develop strategies to rebuild and improve resiliency to future disaster risks
- Coordinate planning efforts with community and regional partners.


